Sir,

In the performance of the duty assigned by the aforesaid Resolution *
I deem it due to the friendly relations subsisting between the States
over which we respectively preside to invite the attention of the constituted
authorities of Pennsylvania to the subject matter of the Resolution,
which I respectfully request that your Excellency will submit to
the Legislature of Pennsylvania for its consideration. And I ask
leave to suggest the appointment of Commissioners on the part of ^{each} ~~the~~
States respectively, with full power to negotiate upon the subject,
and to express the hope that, pending their negotiation, Pennsylvania will
continue to authorize, and, if necessary, provide the reconstruction of the
works complained of which have recently been carried away.
