Six-Yours of the 23d of September last, relative to the Public Arms, has just come to hand-and in compliance with your request, hasten to answer its contents. In the year 1826 or 1827, a Resolution passed the Legislature of Maryland, granting to Capt. Richard J. Somervelle, the privilege of receiving from the Armory sixty muskets, bayonets and cartouch boxes, by his giving bond with securities to the State of Maryland, which he did, with Mr. Jas. Buckmaster and myself. his securities; and received the muskets and accoutrements, which remained in his possession for the use of the company until his decease in May last, since which time I have been promoted to the Captaincy, and of course did take charge of the said Arms, which I now have in my possession, all in good order, and for which I should like, and am ready to give, my bond with approved security, and thereby release the estate of Capt. Somerville. please answer this, and inform me how I can accomplish my wish. Vey respectfully,
