umn, Mr. Robert Mills, with a zeal which did him grat honour, felt it incumbent upon him to see that this necessary ornament should be safely placed, and that the column shoul sustain no injury in the attempt, voluntarily came forward and contracted with the sculptor (who had engaged to place it at his own expense,) to accomplish that object, (which was most successfully done by an ingenious apparatus and powerful means in which he had occasion to call in the ail of skilful assistants at a considerable expense) for the sum of 1500 dollars, but found on closing the accounts relating h the work, that he not only had expended that sum, but fel in debt to the persons employed by him upwards of in dollars, without any compensation for his risk and labour Under these circumstances, I beg leave to recommend the hardship of his case to the consideration of the Legislatur, and hope that his claims for such disinterested services a he has rendered the State in this matter, will receive ther liberal attention.
