If, in accordance with the recommendation of his Excellency the Governor, unusual appropriations should be made at this session of the Legislature, and the tax on Stamps should be repealed (which during the last Fiscal year yielded to the Treasury \$72,664,07 cents) in that event the reduction of the Direct Taxes, especially when we consider the uncertain sources of much of the State revenue, would be a hazardous experiment. Such being the case I should be compelled to answer the question propounded in the negative. If, however, the Legislature do not exceed the appropriations of 1854, and the other sources of Revenue remain untouched, the Direct Tax may be reduced, to the extent indicated, in all probability "without detriment to the State credit."
