Liege & no longer And that in case the said Garielius Calvert
shall happen to survive yo: Lordship, then from & after yo: Lord
decease the said duty & Impescion of two shillings per pound per
charged waisted collected & paid to the said Garielius Calvert
during the termie of his naturall life as aforesaid in such manner
under such paines penaltys & forfittures as by the said Act
by him appointed to be paid to yo: Lordship as aforesaid &
alwaies nevertheless that all & every the severall Provisions
said severall Acts contained doe & shall during the continuall
this Act stand in full force & vertue, & be in sevraly and
everlastingly to be observed.
