twenty per cent, interest; but that having some time in the month of CHAP. May last paid to the treasurer of the eastern shore the sum of one hundred and two thousand five hundred and eighty-eight pounds seventeen shillings and three-pence, which exceeds the sum he was indebted to the state for the thirteen pounds assessment, four thousand nine hundred and thirteen pounds ten shillings and one penny (as appears by faid treasurer's account) which said sum the treasurer retained in his hands on account of the treble tax, part of which he collected in the year seventeen hundred and seventy-seven, but the commissioners of the tax did not think themselves authorised to settle with him, in consequence whereaf he omitted to collect faid tax in seventeen hundred and seventy-eight; but being afterwards informed that a law had passed directing the sheriffs to collect the same, he used his utmost endeavours to complete the collection, but for the reasons before affigned, it was out of his power to do it within the time limited by law; and having also paid on the eighth day of June last, to the commissioners for stating and fettling the public accounts, the further fum of eighteen hundred pounds, there will remain a balance due to the state of two thousand three hundred and twenty-fix pounds nine shillings and five-pence (as appears by said commissioners account, exclusive of interest) which he is ready to pay immediately into the treasury:

II. Be it therefore enacted, by the General Assembly of Maryland, wm. Merrite That the faid William Merritt be and is hereby undernnified and faxed indemnified, harmless from any penalties incurred by reason of his not having paid the amount of the assessment, as aforesaid, within the time heretofore dimited by law for fuch payment, and from any penalties incurred by reason of his not having paid the amount of the treble tax asoresaid within the time limited by law, on his paying to the treasurer of the western shore, on or before the first day of January next, the balance due by him on account of the faid treble tax, amounting to two thoufind three hundred and twenty-fix pounds nine shittings and five-pence continental currency, any law to the contrary notwithstanding.
