 An act to lay out and open a road from Archibald Dysart's tavern in Cecil county, to the Pennsylvania line, in the direction to Lund's tavern.
 An act authorising the raising a sum of money to complete the court-house, and to erect a watch-house, in the city of Baltimore.
 An act for the benefit of Samuel Wright, of the city of Baltimore.
 A Supplement to an act, entitled, An act to alter the public road leading from Mile's river ferry, through the lands of Jacob Lockerman, of Talbot county.
