

The House Adjourned till one of the Clock.

At one of the Clock in the afternoon the House met again.

Then was read the Petition of Marmaduke Snowe which was as follows:

To the Honourable the Upper House of Assembly

The humble Petition of Marmaduke Snowe,

humbly sheweth That whereas there are Errors assigned by Tho: Gerard gent: against your Petitioner to be heard before your Honours in this Honourable Assembly

And forasmuch as your Petitioner being lame & sickly & the Ordinary at this present so full of People that accommodations are wanting to your Petitioners Condition in reference to a continuance

He therefore humbly prays your Honours to cause these Errors to be heard this day otherwise your Honours would be pleased to appoint a day for hearing the same at your Honours Discretion whereby your Petitioner may then attend upon this Honourable Assembly for that End

And he shall pray &c.

And upon the said Petition ordered that on Tuesday next his Busi-
ness be heard & in the mean time that Mr Gerrard his Attorney have timely
notice given him to appear

Ordered that a member of this House go to the Lower House
to tell them that to morrow morning this House will accept of the
conference from the Indians, & that then they may come to declare
their objections against them according to the Order aforesaid
& that Mr Matthews the Interpreter have notice thereto attend.

And notice was given accordingly

There came Mr Thomas Holley & Mr Jr: Morccraft the attorneys
of Thomas Gerrard & presented this following Petition

To the honourable Charles Calvert Esq: Lieutenant

General & Governor & the Rest of the Council

The humble Petition of Thomas Gerrard

Sheweth — That whereas your Petitioner acknowledged a Recog-
nition before the Lord Proprietary of this Province of one thousand
pounds Sterling with a defazance thereupon to Abel Snowe who assigned
the same to Judith Snowe who assigned to Marmaduke Snowe who
sued out a writ facias thereupon & at a Provincial Court the sixth day
of October 1664 had order to have execution thereupon for £1000 sterl.
whereupon the said Marmaduke Snowe sued out execution by way of
levi facias to levy by way of execution the said sum of £1000 sterl.
which was accordingly executed upon your Petitioners Goods & Chattels
to the value of 293: 11: 3 dols the said Marmaduke making further
complaint to the Court that the Sheriff had levied but £99: 11: 3 dols
& not finding any more personal Estate to perfect that Execution, the
