"By order, The faid engroffed bills were read and affented to, and the peper bills feat to the house of dele-

gates by Matthew Tilghman, Efq; On motion, ORDERED, That William Hindman, Elq; wait upon his excellence, and request his attendance in the senate to sign and seal the engrossed bills. The governor appeared in the senate. Ondened, That Matthew Tilghman and Charles Carrell, berrifter, Ligrs. acquaint the house of delegates, that the governor is ready to sign and seal the engressed bills, and request their attendance in the senate; and the following engrolled bills were presented by the speaker to the governor, who figued the same, and affixed the great seal thereto in the preserve of the members of both houses.

No. 1. An act relating to prisoners and deserters from the British army and navy.

No. 2. An act to aid the proceedings of the commissioners of the tax, and for other purposes. No. 3. An act to prohibit, for a limitted time, the exportation of wheat, four, rye, Indian corn,

rice, bread, beef, pork, bacon, live stock, and other victual. No. 4. An act concerning the gun-lock factory in Frederick-Town in Frederick county.

No. 5. A supplementary act to the act, entitled, Anact for King William's school, in Annapolis. No. 6. A supplementary act to an act, entitled, An act for the special appointment of inspectors, and other purposes.

No. 7. An act to continue an act, entitled, An act for ealergieg the power of the governor

and council.

No. 8. An act for the payment of the journal of accounts.

No. 9. An act for the relief of certain nonjurors.

The senate adjourns to the first Monday in November next.
