By order, Messieurs Deye and Chaille, from the house of delegates, deliver to the president a bill, entitled, An act to procure an extra supply of provisions of the bread kind, also waggons and horses, for the use of the continental army, endorsed; "By the house of delegates, July 3, 1780: Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, JULY 4, 1780.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOURS, WE have agreed to recede from the several amendments proposed by this house to the Supplement to the act to procure recruits to complete the battalions of this state, &c. and which were objected to in your message of yesterday, and have sent the bill to be corrected agreeable to the amendments proposed by us and agreed to by your honours. Which was read, concurred with, and the bill ordered to be engrossed. A memorial from commodore Grason and Beriah Maybury, praying that they might obtain orders for back rations due them, was read, referred to the confideration of the house of dele-

gates, and fent by Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, Efq;

The bill, entitled, An act to enable the treasurer of the western shore to draw and sell bills of exchange, and for an emission of bills of credit if necessary, was read the second time, passed, and, with the following message and resolution, sent to the house of delegates by Thomas Stone, Efq; BY THE SENATE, JULY 4, 1780.

GENTLEMEN, BEING very desirous to supply the treasury with money, we have affented to your bill enabling the treaturer to draw and sell bills of exchange, and for an emission if necessary, not because we think it will be most advantageous, but because we have reason to believe it is the best which can be obtained with your confent. We are apprehensive bills of exchange will not be fold to any confiderable amount, and that the emission will be delayed for no valuable purpose, at a time when the exhausted state of the treasury requires a speedy supply. We are of opinion, that an immediate emission of bills of credit, upon the funds proposed, would have been much preserable to your scheme, and should have proposed this alteration, did we suppose there was any chance that it would be adopted; but as we have no expectation that our advice on this subject would influence the determination of your house, and wish to avoid every step which might tend to delay the business, we have not proposed any amendments to the bill. We think it will be proper to give the trustees mentioned in the bill notice of the act empowering the treasurer to draw the money out of their hands, and have for this purpose passed the resolve herewith sent, and submit to your consideration, whether it would not be proper to request the governor and coincil to issue certificates, until money can be obtained, and also to prepare for an emission, that in case it should be necessary, there may be as little delay as possible after the thirty days expire.
