Messieurs Eccleston and Gaunt, from the house of delegates, deliver to the president the above resolution, endorsed; "By the house of delegates, July 5, 1780: Read and assented to. "By order,

ORDERED, That Joseph Sim, Esq; wait on his Excellency, and desire his attendance in the senate to sign and seal the engrossed bills.

The governor appeared in the senate.

ORDERED, That Mutthew Tilghman and Charles Carroll, Barrister, Esquires, wait on the house of delegates, and inform them, that the governor is now attending in the senate room. to fign and feal the engrossed bills, and defire their attendance.

The house of delegates appeared in the senate, and the following engrossed bills were handed to his Excellency by the speaker of the house of delegates, who signed and sealed the same in

presence of the members of both houses.

No. 4. An act for the relief of Zachariah Forrest, collector of the tax for Saint Mary's county.

No. 5. An act for the payment of certain certificates.

No. 6. An act for the relief of Thomas Williams, collector of the assessment in Prince-George's county.

No. 7. An act for the adjournment of Charles county court.

No. 8. An act for finking the quota required by congrets of this state of the bills of credit emitted by congress.

No. 9. An act to continue the acts of assembly therein mentioned.

No. 10. An act to procure recruits to complète the battalions of this state in the service of the

United States, and to raise an additional regiment if necessary.

No. 11. An act to revive actions and process in the court of appeals, to enable any one judge to adjourn the faid court, and to direct the oath of the judges in case of appeals from the court of

No. 12. An act for the relief of those who have and may suffer by the British army.

No. 13. An act for the appointment of several collectors in each county where necessary, and for other purposes therein mentioned.

No. 14. An act for the regulation of the staple of tobacco.

No. 15. An act concerning nonjurors.

No. 16. An act to prevent frauds in commerce, and to direct the duty of naval officers.

No. 17. An act to continue the act of assembly, entitled, An act to prohibit for a limited time the exportation of wheat, flour, rye, Indian corn, rice, bread, veet, pork, bacon, live flock, peas, beans, oats, and other victual, and for other purposes.

. No. 18. An act for the relief of certain nonjurors.

No. 19. An act to enable Conrod Theodore Wederstrandt to draw orders as therein mentioned. No. 20. An act to direct the recording and to give effect to a deed made by Philip Read and Anne his wife, of Saint Mary's county, to George Medley.

No. 21. An act to procure a supply of salt meat for the use of the army.

No. 22. An act to encourage the raising a volunteer troop of light horse in Baltimore-town,

and in each county of this state.

No. 23. An Act, entitled, A Supplement to the act to procure recruits to complete the battalions of this state in the service of the United States, and to raise an additional regiment if necessary.

No. 24. An act to enable the treasurer of the western shore to draw and sell bills of exchange,

and for an emission of bills of credit if necessary.

No. 25. An act to procure an extra supply of provisions of the bread kind, also waggons and horses, for the use of the continental army.

No. 26. An act to expedite the raising an additional battalion of regulars.

No. 27. A Supplement to the act to procuse an extra supply of provisions of the bread kind, alfo waggons and horses, for the use of the continental army.

No. 28. An act relating to loans in specie, tenders for debts and contracts in suture, and the

establishment of a bank for public purposes. No. 29. An act for the payment of the journal of accounts.

The senate adjourns till the first Monday in November next.

So ends this session of assembly, this fifth day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand feven hundred and eighty.
