BY THE SENATE, MAY 26, 1787.

THE bill, entitled, An act to appoint an intendant of the revenue, we have returned with a negative, it appearing to us exceptionable in many parts, and being fent from your house at this late hour of the session, we have not time to bestow upon it that consideration which the many important subjects it comprehends necessarily require. We think it advisable to invest the executive with power to appoint persons to attend the sales and purchase property seized and taken in execution for public dues, and will agree to a resolve for that purpose.
