A sufficient number of members to compose a senate, being convened, they severally qualified in the presence of each other before Richard Harwood, Esquire, one of the justices of the peace for Anne-Arundel county, by taking the several oaths directed by the constitution and form of government, and subscribing a declaration of their belief in the christian religion.

The president lays before the senate a letter from Thomas Johnson, Esquire, declining to accept the appointment of a seat in the senate; which was read.

The senate adjourned till Monday morning 9 o'clock.
