The senate then proceeded to the election of a president, and the ballot box being prepared, he ballots were deposited therein, and on examination thereof it appeared that the honorable. William R. Steuart, was unanimously elected. Whereupon it was declared in the senate that

Mr. William Kilty was unanimously appointed chief clerk, Mr. Charles C. Maccubbin, assistant clerk, and Mr. Thomas W. Loockerman, committee clerk, who severally qualified as such.

Mr. Andrew Slicer, was appointed Messenger, and Mr. Samuel Peaco, door keeper.
