The clerk of the house of delegates delivered the following messages, which were read.

By the House of Delegates, January 30th, 1827.

Gentlemen of the Senate,

We have received your message, proposing to go into the election of bank directors on the part of the state, and agree thereto. The following gentlemen are put in nomination, in addition to those named by the senate. For the Mechanics bank, Henry B. Griffith. For the Union bank, John H. B. Morton, William Meeteer. For the Commercial and Farmers bank, Stephen H. Ford, and Robert H. Burns. Messrs. Duvall, and John W. Thomas, are appointed tellers, on the part of this house, to join those on the part of the senate, to count the ballots and report the result.

Also, a bill entitled, an act for the relief of Mary Snowden of Cecil county, which was read the first time, and referred to the committee on divorces.

The senate proceeded to the election of directors on the part of the state, in the several banks. The ballot box being prepared, the ballots were deposited therein, sealed up, and delivered to the committee of the senate, appointed to meet the committee of the house of delegates, to count the ballots, who retired to the conference room.

Mr. Marriot from the committee to whom was referred, the bill to authorise the several orphans courts of this state, to order the sale of real estates in certain cases, reported that the committee had had the same under consideration, and were of opinion that it ought not to pass. The bill was then read a second and third time by special order, rejected unanimously, and returned to the house of delegates.

The senate adjourned until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.
