

shore, reported the same with the following amendments, viz: 1st. After the words "twenty three," in the 3rd and 4th lines of the 1st section, insert the words, "chapter one hundred and ninety-five."—2nd. After the word "treasurers," in the 4th line, same section, insert the words "of the state."—3rd. After the word "western" in the last line, same section, insert "and eastern."—4th. At the end of the bill add "and the bond hereafter to be given by the register of the land office for the eastern shore, shall be taken and approved by the chief judge, or one of the associate judges of the second judicial district of this state."—5th. Amend the title of the bill, by inserting after the word "western," the words "and eastern," which amendments were read and assented to. The bill was then read a second and third time by special order, passed, with the proposed amendments and returned to the house of delegates.

The bill for the benefit of Alfred H. Dashiell, and others, of the city of Baltimore, was read a second time by special order, and ordered to be engrossed for a third reading

The bill for the benefit of Elizabeth Smith, of Washington county, was read a third time, passed, and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Heath from the committee, reported a bill entitled, an act to regulate the corporate elections of the city of Baltimore, and the appointment of corporation officers, which was read the first time, and ordered to be printed.

The bill for the benefit of Alfred H. Dashiell and others, of the city of Baltimore, was read a third time by special order, passed, and sent to the house of delegates.

Mr. Harrison, from the committee to whom was referred, the bill to repeal an act entitled, an act to repeal certain acts of assembly, relative to amerciements and to lay a tax on plaintiffs who may institute suits at law, offered the following message, which was read.

By the Senate, February 1st, 1827.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

The senate have received your message of the twenty ninth ultimo, stating that you had rejected the bill entitled, "An act, to repeal an act entitled, an act to repeal certain acts of assembly, relative to amerciements, and to lay a tax on plaintiffs who may institute suits at law," believing the same to be a money bill, which the constitution requires should originate in your house. While the bill was pending before the senate the suggestion was made, that it was a money bill, but on due consideration it was thought otherwise.—The senate conceive the expression of the constitution, "that the house of delegates may originate all money bills" applies exclusively to bills assessing, levying, or applying taxes or supplies for
