

The bill was then read a third time by special order, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Sewell from the committee reported a bill entitled, a further supplement to the act entitled, an act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road from the city of Baltimore to Havre-de-Grace, which was read the first and by special order a second time, and ordered to be engrossed for a third reading.

Mr. Dennis, from the committee to whom was referred the bill entitled, an act to provide for the valuation and condemnation of a lot of land at the mouth of Cambridge creek, in Dorchester county, for the erection and establishment of a tide mill, reported, that a majority of the committee were of opinion that the said bill ought to pass.

The bill was then read a second time, and made the order of the day for to-morrow.

Mr. Kennedy, from the committee, made a favourable report upon the bill to authorise the moderator and commissioners of Hagerstown, to levy the sum of three hundred dollars for certain purposes.—The said bill was then read a second, and third time by special order, passed, and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Heath made a favourable report upon the bill to repeal and alter all such parts of the constitution and form of government as relate to the division of Baltimore county into election districts, the said bill was then read a second and by special order a third time passed and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Forrest asked and obtained leave to bring in a bill to be entitled, an act for the relief of Sarah Henderson of Montgomery county, ordered that Messrs. Forrest, Herbert and Kennedy, be a committee to prepare and report the same.

Mr. Forrest from the committee, reported the said bill and it was read the first time.

On motion, the bill to provided for the building of a Bridge over the Patapsco Falls, at or near the Thistle Factory, was referred to Messrs. Marriott, Heath and Forrest.

Mr. Herbert from the committee, to whom was referred the bill to regulate and organize the militia of this state reported that the committee were of opinion that it ought not to pass. The bill was then read a second, and by special order a third time, rejected and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Herbert, from the same committee, offered the following message, which was read, assented to, and sent to the house of delegates, with the bill to which it relates.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

After due deliberation, we have rejected the bill entitled, an act to regulate and organize the militia of this state, be-
