Determined in the affirmative, and the message was sent to the house of delegates,

The bill to authorise and empower the levy court of Frederick county, to levy a sum of money, and rebuild a bridge over Monocacy on the road leading from Taneytown to Emmitsburg, in said county, was read the third time, passed, and returned to the house of delegates.

The resolution 'authorising the executive to have a case placed in the chancery office to hold certain records' received from the house of delegates on Saturday last, was read the first, and by special order a second and third time, assented to, and returned to the house of delegates.

The bill to regulate the entering or recording satisfaction of any judgment or decree entered or rendered in any court of this state, received from the house of delegates on Saturday, was read a first time, and referred to Messrs. Harrison, Rees and Dennis.

Mr. Heath, from the committee to whom was referred the bill entitled, an act to provide for the printing and publication of the laws of this state, reported the same with the following amendment, viz. After the word "as" in the 6th line of the second page, insert the words "the governor by and with;" which amendment was read and assented to. The bill so amended was ordered to lie on the table.

The bill for the benefit of John Aisquith, the administrator of Robert C. Aisquith of the city of Baltimore, was read a second, and by special order a third time, amended, passed with the proposed amendment, and returned to the house of delegates. Amendment proposed, viz.

1st. In the 1st section 2nd line, strike out the words, "Baltimore county," and insert "city of Baltimore."

2nd. In the 3d line, same section, from the word "directed," strike out all that follows to the end of the section, and insert in lieu thereof the following: "to ascertain what sums of money John Aisquith, as administrator of the estate of the said Robert C. Aisquith, is justly entitled to be
