And returned the bill to provide for the condemning and opening of an alley in the city of Baltimore, as a public high-way, endorsed "will pass with the proposed amendment;" amendment proposed, viz: add as the 6th section of the bill, "and be it enacted, that this act shall have no force or validity until approved of by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore." Which amendment was read and assented to.
