Determined in the negative. So the bill was rejected.

The senate proceeded to the consideration of the bill to abolish imprisonment for debt in certain cases, the same being one of the orders of the day, when on motion by Mr. Dennis, the said bill was recommitted.

The clerk of the house of delegates delivered a bill, entitled, an act to authorise George Parker, senior, to remove a negro boy from the state of Delaware to this State which was read the first time, and referred to Messrs Dennis, Lloyd and Harrison.

Also, a bill entitled, an act to provide for the restoration and condemnation of water at the mouth of Windsor's Creek, in Somerset County, for the erection and establishment of a tide Mill, which was read the first time and referred to Messrs. Dennis, Whiteley and Sewell.

Also, a bill entitled a supplement to the act entitled, an act for the more effectual protection of public worship in this state, passed at December session 1824, chapter 53 which was read the first time.

Mr. Herbert from the committee to whom was referred the communication and report of the trustees of the University of Maryland, this day received by the Senate, reported a bill entitled, an additional supplement to the act entitled, an act for founding an University in the city or precincts of Baltimore by the name of the University of Maryland, which was read the first time.

On motion, Mr. Forrest, the bill respecting naturalization, was re-committed

The Clerk of the House of Delegates delivered a bill entitled, an act to repeal an act entitled, a further supplement to the act entitled, an act for making certain roads in Bal-
