

On each of said amendments the question was put, "will the senate assent to the same"—it was determined in the affirmative, and the amendments were accordingly incorporated into the bill.

On motion, the bill entitled, an act to provide for the making the several turnpike roads, and for the extension of the charters of the several banks therein mentioned, was made the order of the day for Wednesday next the 6th instant.

The senate adjourned until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock

Tuesday, 5th February, 1828.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday.

The proceeding of yesterday were read.

Mr. Nelson presented the petition of Lucy T. Guynn, of Frederick County, praying leave to remove a negro male slave from Virginia to this state, which was read, and referred to Messrs. Nelson, Herbert and Johnson.

Mr. Harrison from the committee to whom was referred the bill entitled, an additional supplement to the act, entitled, an act for the distribution of a certain fund for the purpose of establishing Free Schools in the several counties therein mentioned, reported favorably on said bill—which was then read a second and by special order a third time, passed and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Kennedy from the committee to whom the subject was referred, reported a bill entitled, an act to repeal an act, relating to a road lately located from Sharpsburgh to Hagerstown in Washington County, which was read a first and second time by special order, and ordered to be engrossed for a third reading.

Mr. Heath from the committee to whom was referred the bill entitled, an act to repeal an act entitled, "A further supplement to the act entitled, an act for making certain roads in Baltimore and Harford Counties, passed at December session 1815, chapter 43, reported that the committee had had said bill under consideration and that a majority of said committee had directed him to say, they were of opinion the bill ought to pass, from which opinion, he asked leave distinctly to state, he dissented. The bill was then read a second and by special order a third time, and on the question being put, "shall the bill pass"—it was determined in the negative, and the bill was returned to the house of delegates.
