

The Senate proceeded to the election of Directors on the part of the state in the several banks, the ballot box being prepared, the ballots were deposited therein, sealed up and delivered to the committee on the part of the Senate, appointed to meet the committee on the part of the House of Delegates to unite in counting the ballots, who retired to the conference room and after some time returned and reported that on counting the ballots they had found that for the Mechanics Bank of Baltimore, William Stewart had fifty-nine votes, Tobias E. Stansbury had forty votes, and Henry B. Griffith had sixty-eight votes. For the Union Bank of Maryland, Hugh M. Eldery had fifty-two votes, William Bromwell had thirty votes, Nathaniel Pearce had forty-three votes, and Charles C. Egerton had forty five votes. For the Commercial and Farmers' Bank of Baltimore, Richard Estep had 49 votes, William Crawford, jr. had 34 votes, Greenbury B. Wilson had 18 votes, Stephen H. Ford had 30 votes, and George Riston had 46 votes. For the Farmers' Bank of Maryland, Jeremiah Towaley Chase had 76 votes and Theodorick Bland had 75 votes. For the Branch Bank at Easton, William Clark had 71 votes, Theodore R. Loockerman had 47 votes, and Lambert W. Spencer had 46 votes. For the Elkton Bank, Adam Whann had 79 votes, and for the Hager's Town Bank, John Van Lear had 79 votes, and Daniel Schnebly had 79 votes.

On the clerks proceeding to announce the names of the persons appointed, out of the number voted for, in conformity with the report of the committee, Mr. Lloyd moved that the reading of the declaration of the appointments should be dispensed with, and with the report ordered to lie on the table, and the question was put on, Mr. Lloyd's motion and determined in the affirmative.

The Senate adjourned until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

Thursday, February 7th, 1828.

The senate met. Present the same members as on yesterday, except Mr. Johnson.

The proceeding of yesterday were read.
