February 29, 1836.

Mr. Morris from the committee to which was referred the bill entitled, an act relating to Chatsworth street in the city of Baltimore, reported that the committee had had said bill under consideration and were of opinion it ought to pass the following amendment,

Which was read and assented to.

Add to the bill as follows:

Sec. 2. And be it enacted, That the provisions of this act shall be of no force or effect unless the same shall be approved by the mayor and city council of Baltimore.

Sec. 3. And be it enacted, That the mayor and city council of Baltimore before they finally pass upon the acceptance of this act, shall first cause an advertisement to be
