

ceptance of this act, shall first cause an advertisement to be published for one week in the daily newspapers of the city of Baltimore, the expense of the said advertisement to be paid by the party or parties applying for the passage of this ordinance, at the same time notifying all persons interested to make their objections, if any they have, to the passage of said ordinance, on or before some day to be fixed by the mayor and city council of Baltimore.

The bill was then read the second and by special order the third time passed and returned to the House of Delegates.

Mr Hughlett and Mr. Emory who had been appointed in conjunction with a committee of the House of Delegates, to wait on His Excellency Governor Veazey, and invite his attendance in the Senate Chamber, to sign and seal the engrossed bills, retired, and after a time returned and reported, that they had discharged the duty assigned them, and had been desired by His Excellency to say, he would attend at the hour named.

The Senate adjourned until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

TUESDAY, March 1, 1836.

The Senate met. Present the same Senators as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. Emory from the committee on the militia, to which was referred the resolution relative to the sale of certain military stores, reported favorably thereon.

It was read the second and by special order the third time assented to, and returned to the House of Delegates.
