On motion of Mr. Pigman,

The bill entitled, an act to incorporate the Greensborough Manufacturing Company, was taken up for consideration.

The amendments and substitute heretofore reported were read.

On motion of Mr. Wootton,

The said bill, amendments and substitute were ordered to lie on the table.

The clerk of the House of Delegates delivered the following resolutions:

A resolution relative to so much of the act of 1834, as provides for the completion of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal to Cumberland.

Which was read the first time and referred to the committee on internal improvement.

A resolution in favor of Margaret Waters,

Which was read the first time, and referred to the committee on revolutionary claims.

Also the following bills:

A bill entitled, an act for the relief of the crier, jurymen and bailiffs of Harford county,

Which was read the first time, and referred to the committee on judicial proceedings.

A bill entitled, an act for the extension of Caroline street in the city of Baltimore,

Which was read the first time and referred to Messrs. Mayer, Morris and Montgomery.

A bill entitled, an act to authorize George W. Devicmon, the next friend of Thomas, Margaret, Anne, Daniel and Peter Devicmon, to bring into this state a negro slave for life.

A bill entitled, an act to authorize Michael Wilson, to bring into this state certain negro slaves for life,

A bill entitled, an act to authorize Thomas Hayward, to bring certain negroes into this state, and

A bill entitled, an act to authorize William J. Weir, of Prince William county in the state of Virginia, to bring a certain number of negroes into this state,

Which were severally read the first time and referred to the committee on colored population.
