

For the foregoing reasons, we cannot see the justice of issuing the stock of the State, and fixing it as a tax on the Tobacco interest, when funds more than sufficient to accomplish the object for which the money is wanted, have been received into the State's Treasury.

We believe there is sufficient latitude given to the Executive, in the resolution, to enable them to accommodate the payments to suit the convenience of the Treasury, and that there will be no want of unappropriated funds in the Treasury, together with the accruing revenue from the warehouses to accomplish the object in view by the resolution.

We therefore, respectfully request that your honorable body, will reconsider the resolutions above referred to and pass them.
