

Which was read and assented to.

Add at the end of the bill,

“And provided also, that the said administrator shall first obtain the assent of the orphans court of Kent county, who shall pass all debts when they shall have been so paid.”

Mr. Emory from the committee on colored population, to which was referred the bill entitled an act to allow Mary Magruder, of Prince Georges county, to bring into this state a negro woman therein named, reported favourable thereon.

It was read the second and by special order the third time, passed, and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Emory from the committee on colored population, to which was referred the bill entitled an act to authorize John Ross Key to bring into this state from the District of Columbia, a certain negro boy therein named, reported that the committee had had said bill under consideration, and were of opinion it ought not to pass.

It was read the second and by special order the third time, rejected, and returned to the house of delegates.

Mr. Emory from the committee to which was referred the bill entitled an act to fix the compensation of jurors, commissioners of the tax, judges of the orphans court, and justices of the Levy court in Kent county, reported that the committee had had said bill under consideration, and were of opinion it ought not to pass.

It was read the second and by special order the third time, rejected, and returned to the house of delegates

On motion of Mr. Emory,

The bill entitled an act to incorporate the Hamilton Bank, which was rejected in the forenoon, was reconsidered.
