

if he declines it at present.

To the bill for reviving the Temporary Lawes, His Lord^t says that in that bill there is mentioned an act for killing of wolves to be revived by the same, which ought not to have been there. . . . because by an act of Assembly for ascertaining of Lawes of this province of Sayd act is made perpetuall and he has no need of being revived.

To which Mr^r Speaker made answere that though t^e Act was by a mistake put into t^e Act for ascertaining the Lawes, which Law for ascertaining the Lawes is a perpetuall Law, yet he humbly conceives that the Act for killing of wolves, being in its owne body expressed to be temporary is not made perpetuall by being barely inserted into the other for though that Law bee perpetuall which ascertaynes the Lawes therein mentioned to be Lawes, yet he conceives it changeth not t^e nature or quality of any Law from being temporary to be perpetuall, but only ascertaynes them to be Lawes in such manner and forme, and to such intent and purpose as in the body of the same Lawes were before except.

To which His Lord^t replies t^e Act for killing of wolves is without doubt made perpetuall, because the act which ascertaynes, t^e same to be a law is perpetuall and hath ascerteyned t^e act to be a law accordingly.

Therefore His Lord^t desires Mr^r Speaker and t^e Members of the Lower house to return to the Lower house and consider thereof, and also to consider t^e in t^e sayd act of Reviver are conteyned severall good Lawes necessary to be revived, which His Lord^t says he is willing to assent to, and that the bill for killing of wolves be left out of t^e sayd Bill.

Whereupon Mr^r Speaker and the Members returned to their house and take their places. And after severall arguments and debates concerning t^e same. It was put to the Question, whether a new bill of Reviver shall bedrawne leaving out t^e Act for killing of wolves.

Voted in the Negative.

The question was then put whether the same bill be again presented to His Lord^t for his assent: Resolved in the affirmative.

Then this house goe into the Upper house, and after severall arguments relating to t^e sayd Bill of Reviver His Lord^t disassented to t^e sayd Bill but to the other Bills, being six in Number Entituled as followeth:

1. A Bill for Ratting allying Peter Mayne de Moyne and others.
2. A Bill Limiting t^e Extent of Attachments and Executions.
3. A Bill Regulating t^e Tars and Abuses in Tobacco Hogsheads.
4. A Bill for Naturalizing Johnstone Johnson and others.
5. A Bill for Advancement of Trade.
6. A Bill for Payment and Offsetting t^e publique Charge.

His Lord^t commands t^e Great Seal to be affixed, and with his own hand subscribed these words vif: - We will these to be Lawes
