3. That His Lordshippe desires this house that his going for England is not because of any greater inclination to that place then to his owne Province of Maryland. But an absolute necessity putt upon him for determining certayne matters in difference between himselfe and the Proprietary of Pennsylvania, relating to the bounds of his Province: which he soon as kindest, and that he can be in a condition to leave his Heires in an undisturb'd right to this Province, he is Resolved to returne hither againe where notably his Interest, bid his inclination is.

Fourthly - His Lordshippe says that it will not be above a month before he must depart this Province upon his voyage for England, and of much busyness as well publique as private lies upon him, Yet he is willing to spende a fortnight of that time, with his two houses for settling the weighty affaires of this his Province and desirous the Lower House to be sollicitous about the same.

Fifthly, His Lordshippe tooke notice that Mr. Speaker had adjourned the Lower House till this day with a less number of Members then had been usuall at some other times, Yet since yr. Same was done with a good Intention to save this Session of Assembly his Lordshippe declares he is well content therewith.
