Tobacco Law shall be amended or repealed - Resolved that it be repealed and Ordered
that the Committee of Laws prepare a Bill for the repeal thereof - Then the Question was
put whether any Bill shall be brought in for the Prohibiting Tobacco or not
Carried in the Negative by the Majority of Voices - Bill for the relief of Francis
Gardout and John Read was read the first and Second times by Especial Order and passed
which was so Endorsed and sent to the Upper house by Col^l Watts & Captain Harrison
