Gentlemen of the Upper and Lower Houses of Assembly
Baltimore { We take this opportunity by the mouth of our well
beloved Charles Calvert our Cousin and Lawt^r to acquaint
you with the reasons which have moved us to place him over you. His Ap-
proved Loyalty and his faithful service to our Great Sovereign King George -
the many observations which (during his Friendship with us) we
have of his kind wishes and harty Endeavours as much as in their Occasion-
ally lay to make the interest of the Province and Proprietary one without
either extending our prerogatives or lessening your privileges which
(now we have put power into his hands) we doubt not but he will:
and we strictly command him punctually to balance.

We cannot omit Gentlemen, on this occasion to disapprove the late hasty
proceedings of Thomas Brooke Esq^r tho' we have reason to believe he intended
nothing more to our and your service thereby: and very much condemn your
malicious reports and insinuations of those who have endeavoured to distract
the minds of the good people of Maryland by suggesting that we had sent a
private Commission to the said Thomas Brooke to take upon him the Government
during the residence of our late Lieutenant John Hart Esq^r a method we scorn
to rule by and which has induced us to change our design of administering
the Government by the person first named in our Councils and place it as we
have done till such time the affairs of your Lord and Proprietary will allow
him to reside among you himself or he shall otherwise dispose thereof when
he hopes to bury those seeds of Rancour and Jealousie which have too long
prevailed among the people and so to unite their hearts and minds that the
misquided part of the Province desenting from our blessed Establishment both
in Church and State will peaceably and quietly submit to the known Laws
by his mild yet due Execution of them.
