I N Answer to your Message by Mr. Benjamin Maskall and Mr. Walter Smith, and in Respect to the Report therewith sem from the Committee of Agrievances relating to the Complaints exhibited by fundry of the good People of this Province, against the late Management of the Secretary's and Commissary's Offices; we take Leave to observe that the Officers of those respective Offices having no Law to regulate their Fees by, may not be thought (by their late demands) so much to have oppress'd the Inhabitants of this Province, is it be consider'd how great a Disparity and Difference there is in respect of the real Value of the Fees paid to the said Officers, when they are and are not upon Execution. And tho' we conceive the Infifting on Money-Fees to be a Hardship on his Lordship's Tenants, as well as its being in the Option of Officers to demand what Fees they please; yet we are of Opinion, that the best Remedy to prevent the like Complaints for the future, will be to revive the late Law for regulating Officers Fees, until next Sessions of Assembly; at which Time there will be more Leisure to consider of this Affair, with a Clause to be added, That all Obligations taken in those Offices for fuch Fees as have accrued since the Expiration of the late Law, be void, and those Fees to be regulated and paid according to that Law.
