Gentlemen of the Upper and Lower Honses of Assembly,

THE PUBLICK GOOD, is the General End of our Meetings in Ag fembly: which will be pursu'd with best Success three in Ag sembly; which will be pursu'd with best Success, thro' the Patis of Loyalty, Moderation and Justice; to which natural Reason, and a calm Reflection on Things, must fusficiently incite us; and therein, her to the benign Influence of the Great Author of Wildom, I doubt not be you will meet a happy Guidance in your own Knowledge and Experience

Gentlemen of the House of Delegales,

THE Law for ascertaining the Gauge and Tare of Tolaco. Hogsheads, and for other Things therein mention'd, is near Expus. tion: As I have not receiv'd any Instructions from his Lordship to the contrary, I think my self at Liberty to offer his Good Tenants the Continuation for Three Years more, of That Law, whereby their Tenancy is made so very easy to them: But as the late Law br stinting the Number of Tobacco Plants, may considerably lessen the Export of Hogsheads, the Raising an Equivalent thereto, to His Lord. ship, must appear both just and necessary; lest his Indulgency to his Tenants, should prove unreasonably disadvantageous to himself.

Gentlemen of both Houses,

NOTHING can be more desirable, than a Certainty in Matters of Property, by bringing Controversies of Right to a known End; wherefore it may seem necessary to limit the Time for Appeals from Chancery, as well as to regulate the Nature of them: And, as a Question has arose, Whether in the Absence of the Governour, and first of the Council in Commission, the Senior of the Council then present may preside, and proceed to a Determination on Appeals and Writs of Error? It will be prudent to solve it, by Impowering, in such Cate, the Senior present so to preside and proceed; otherwise great Inconveniencies and Delays may happen by the Absence of the Governour or first in Commission; or when either or both should be Parties concern'd in the Matters in Dispute.

I HERETOFORE advised a separate Repository for our old Records; and I hope you will no longer delay a Security so essential to preserve the Rights of your Selves and your Posterity, from the In-

jury of common Accidents.

THE Act against Engrossers and Regrators, might be very beneficial to the People of this Province, were not the Sense thereof consusedly express'd; but a Revisal and Explanation of it, may supply its Desects.

THIS leads me to recommend great Care and Caution in the Penning of Laws; since it little availeth to be cautious and circumspect in our Consultations, if we are not equally such in forming our

Resolutions into Laws.

HAVING thus deliver'd some Things to your Consideration, it remains with you to advise whatever else may be necessary or convenient to promote our General Welfare. And you may be well assured, I shall not fail to advance, to the utmost of my Power, the united Interests of His Majesty, the Lord Proprietary, and the Good People of Maryland.
