former Tobacco-Law, and therein you have been pleased to concur with us, by sending up to our House such a Bill, which we have maturely considered, and returned to your House, with the proper Sign'd per Order, John Ross, Cl. Up. Hs. Indorsement.

The Question was pur, Whether this House should agree with the Amendments proposed by the Upper House to the Tobacco Bill, or not? Resolv'd in the Affirmative. Col. Rider, from the Upper House, delivers to Mr. Speaker the following Message, viz-By the Upper House of Assembly, August 6, 1729.

We take the Occasion once more, of inforcing the Consideration of our former Messages relating Gentlemen, to the Ast for preventing the Abuses in concealing convicting Felons, and other Offenders, imported into this Province, &c. the Reasons of our former Message appearing every Day more and more obvious.
