The Hon<sup>ble</sup> Address of the Lower House of Assembly  
May it Please Your Excellency:

We His Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects the  
Representatives of the Freeman of Maryland in Assembly convened, Petition your Excellency  
Our Unfeigned thanks for your kind Speech at the Opening of this Session, and although we are  
Concerned, that you have not yet received, the Lordships Answer, to the Joint Address of both  
Houses, Occasioned, as we suppose, by the contrary Winters, which have Hindred the Arrival of the  
Expected Ships, yet we hope soon to receive a favourable Answer thereto.

We Gratefully Acknowledge the Assurance you are pleased to give us, of Readily  
and heartily assisting us all that is in your power, in anything that may be of Service to the Country;  
which as it is an Encouragement, to us to consider, in the best manner we are able, what may be  
Advantageous; so it gives us hopes that Something may be Done, for the Advantage of the People  
we represent Wherein the Experience we have had of your Excellency's sincere regard for the  
Welfare and prosperity of this Province leaves us no room to Doubt your concurrence  
and assistance.
