The Governor communicated the following Answer to the Address of this House :

Gentlemen of the Lower House of Assembly,

I Have considered your Address delivered to me on Thursday last, and can very truly assure you, that it has been my constant and uninterrupted View and Aim, ever since I had the Honour of being appointed Governor of this Province, to Promote the general Happiness and Prosperity of it, by all the Ways and Means that have lain in my Power, and I have the pleasure of flattering myself, that my Endeavours have not been without some Success, but that both the Trade and Riches of the Province have greatly Increased during the Time of my Administration, and I am persuaded they would have done so in a much higher Degree, had our Paper Money been put upon that Foot of Credit, which the Government laboured so heartily and sincerely to give it, and which could be done no other Way but by putting it to as many Uses as possible, as must be readily allowed by every Man of Understanding who has given any reasonable Attention to Trade, and the proper Means of carrying it on.

As what I now say is not only well known to all Men of Business here, but to every Merchant in *London* who is acquainted with the Trade of this Province, I hope it will be looked upon as a sufficient Answer to all general
