Gerthenen of the Universed Lower Houses of Assembly, according to your Prorogation, as I thought it would not only be a recardle to yourselves, but to the Satisfaction of the People of Maryland in general, to have the Littlence of the Legislature at this Time, when our Staple of Tobacco, and consequently every other Branch of

our Trace, is in to very low and languishing a Condition. *

And I have the greater Hopes that iomething may be done for the publick Good, as our Neighbours of Virginia have there are very plainty, that Tobacco may be made a very valuable Commodity; and as their Inspection Line has now flood affirmed of many Years, and been improved from time to time, to the general Saussaction of all Parties, it may perhaps be more prudent in us, to follow their fixample, in what has been already tryed, and found by Experience to sacceed, than to go upon any uncertain Experiments of our own, however promising they may appear; especially as our form r naws, for limiting the Number of Plants, and burning our Trash, proved to very ineffectual for the Purpose intended.

But whatever Method you may think proper to proceed in, you may be affured of my Readiness to do every Thing in my Power, to help you to overcome all Difficulties, in this, or in any Thing else, that may be proposed

for the Happiness and Prosperity of Province.

And I flatter myself, you are met together with the same good Disposition on your Part; and that you will readily and chearfully give all the Asistance to the Government, that can be reasonably expected of you, in such Things as the Dury of my Station will always oblige me to recommend to you in a particular Manner, the principal of which is a Provision of Arm and Ammunition for the Desence of the Province; and I hope you will think it the short necessary at this time of real and imminent Danger, as the Legislature sound themselves obliged to distribute so great a Part of the Arms, that had been provided for ourselves, to the Forces that were raised here for his Majesty's service; and the Impossibility of providing them any where but out of our own Magazine, shows how dangerous it might be to us, to have them to look for upon any sudden Emergency.

If any I hing further occurs to me during the Course of your Proceedings, I shall communicate it to you; in the mean Time, you may be assured, that no Man in the Province is more sincerely inclined to promote the Prosperity of it than myself; and that I will make it my constant Rule, never to propose any Thing to you as Governor,

that Ishall not think for the Good of the Country as a Planter.

Mr. Speaker, and the other Members, returned to the Lower House.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

It appearing to the House, that M. John Dennis, one of the Members for

Somer fet County, hath accepted the Office of Sheriff of Somer fet County,

Ordered, That Mr. Speaker issue his Warrant, directed to the Secretary of this Province, to make out a new Writ of Election, that the free Voters of the said County may proceed without Delay, to make Choice of a Delegate to serve in this Assembly, in the Room of the said John Dennis.

The House continues the several Committees, with the several Clerks, as were

last Session.

Resolved, That the Hours of Sitting, during this Session, be from Nine o'Clock in the Morning until Twelve, and from Two in the Asternoon until Six.

Ordered, That Mr. Dulany acquaint the Rev. Mr. Gordon, that he is defired by the House to read Divine Service, Morning and Evening, during this Session. Ordered, That the Committee of Laws prepare an Address to the Governor, on his Speech.

The House adjourns 'til Monday Morning 9 of the Clock.

MONDAY, May 18, 1747.

THE House met according to Adjournment. Mr. Philip Hammond, Buchenan, Capt. Harrison, Mr. Brown, Col. John Hall, and Mr. John Stoddert, appeared in the House.

Mr. Hammend, from the Committee of Laws, delivers to Mr. Speaker an Address to the Governor; which was read, approved, and ordered to be ingrossed.

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
