The Sufferers, in kopes of recovering at least some Part of what they have been defrauded of, fued out Attacrments, as their only Remacy, in View of getting some of the Merchants Effectsein the Country, wherein some save secceeded, but many more have only added to their first Loss, by running themselves to a great and fruitiess Expence. Those who have had any Success, are threatned to be called to a severe Accoun, for caring to meddle with the Effects of a Merchant, who, in Violation of the I'ruit repoted in him, has converted Money to his own Ufe, which has odged in his Hands, with Directions to disp ise of it in a particular Manner, for the Benefit of those it belonged to; and a new Doctrine is attempted to be introduced, that the Effects in this Province, le longing to a Merchant who never was here, are as: subject to an Attachment.

We are in ormed that they do not intend to stop here, but are resolved to apply to the Parliament, for an Act to screen and secure all their Effects in the Plantations, from all kinds of Process; and if they should preval, we must be entirely at their Mercy; And therefore, that we m y not be wan ing to ourselves, in doing all we are able to avert the impending Danger; in order to which, we propose to send a fair State of our Case to his Loroship, and an Adiress to him, to oppose any such Act passing. An . that we may save time as much as possible, we will either send you the Case and Address for your Consideration, or ione of our Members will confer with such of yours, as you shall

appoint on the Su ject. The Governor is here ready to comply with your Request, and this House will continue sitting 'til we know

whether you will enter into the Confideration of what is mentioned in this Meffage.
