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the best information they are able to get, are of opinion, that the state of Maryland ought to incorporate their risle and German companies, and other detached corps, if any, into a regiment or battalion, and that no other mode will be to agreeable to the companies of the different states, and that they enjoy the same privileges, and be entitled to the same bounties and cloathing, that the officers and soldiers in the line are entitled to.

And we are further of opinion, that the officers and foldiers raised in this state, and now in colonels Hazen's, Spencer's, Gist's, and major Lee's corps, ought to enjoy the same privileges, bounties, and cloathing, that the officers and soldiers in the line are entitled to receive.

All which is submitted to the consideration of the honourable house.

The question was then put, That seventy-five pounds be paid for said express? Resolved in

the affirmative.

Mr. John Henry, from the conferrees, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker the following report:

At a conference of both houses of assembly, appointed to consider the eligibility of gentlemen balloted out, and to establish a mode of procedure respecting the election of members to congress,

WERE PRESENT,

Brice T. B. Worthington, Charles Carroll of Carrollton, and Thomas Stone, Esquires, senators. David M'Mechen, John Hall, John Henry, Samuel Chase, and Richard Tilghman Earle, Esquires, delegates.

Who made choice of Brice T. B. Worthington, Esq. chairman, and Mr. John Callahan, clerk.

YOUR conferrees, having taken into confideration the purpose of their meeting, have

agreed to the following resolutions:

That in case of death, disqualification, resignation, or removal out of the state, of any person chosen a delegate to congress, no ballot shall be taken to exclude such person, but such death, disqualification, resignation, or removal, shall be considered as making such rotation or change in the delegation to congress as the form of government requires.

That the election of delegates to congress be annually on the Friday next after the second

Monday in November.

That where any delegate to congress shall be excluded from the nomination by ballot, and a vacancy shall thereafter happen, by the death, disqualification, resignation, or removal out of the state, of any delegate who has served for the preceding year, such person, so excluded, may be eligible at any subsequent election; and in case sour of the members who have served the preceding year be not elected into the delegation, then any member, so excluded as aforesaid, may be elected to fill any subsequent vacancy, so that not more than sour of the delegates of the preceding year be continued in the delegation at one and the same time.

Which was read the first and second time by especial order and concurred with.

Whereas it is represented to this general assembly by John Bullen, who was appointed by the deputy quarter-master-general to act as his assistant at the post of the city of Annapolis, and was licensed to act as such by the governor and the council, that he is at present entirely destitute of money, that the post at Annapolis cannot be supplied with forage, and that the public service will greatly suffer, unless he is immediately supplied with cash, which cannot be obtained in time from the continental treasury; therefore RESOLVED, That the governor and the council be requested to surnish the said John Bullen with such sums of money as they may think necessary, not exceeding five thousand pounds, for the use of his department, which said sum is to be charged to the United States.
