

John Smith, Esq; from the senate, delivers to Mr. Speaker a memorial from Philip Richard Fendall, setting forth, that in the year 1775, he, with Charles Grahame, became jointly and severally bound, by their bonds, to sundry persons in Maryland and Virginia, who shipped and consigned their tobaccos to James Russell, merchant in London, by which they are bound to pay the owners the net proceeds thereof, which he intended to pay with the effects of the said James Russell in this state; that he has been informed there is a bill for confiscating British debts, and praying he may be indemnified; and also a memorial from Michael Wallace, praying to be allowed the depreciation of his pay while he acted as a surgeon in the army; severally endorsed; "By the senate, May 30, 1782: Read and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.
