THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of day were read.

The bill relating to the fines to be imposed on jurymen, witnesses, and constables; the bill to make partition between this state and Thomas Russell, &c. the bill for the speedy application of the monies appropriated for repairing the streets in Baltimore-town, &c. the bill in favour of Legh Master; the bill to repeal certain duties; and the bill to empower George Gray to sell the lots and houses in Port-Tobacco, &c. were sent to the senate by Mr. Stone and Mr. King.

Mr. Hall appeared in the house.

Matthew Tilghman, Esq; from the senate, delivers to Mr. Speaker the bill for the relief of Richard Richards, &c. the bill for vesting an estate in fee simple in Eleazer, M'Comb, &c. and the additional supplement to the act to settle and adjust the accounts of the troops of this state, &c. severally endorsed; "By the senate, June 7, 1782: Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The petitions from the inhabitants of Nanticoke manor, and the inhabitants of Charles and St. Mary's counties, were read and referred to the next session of assembly.

The bill to empower Catherine Woolsey to sell the real estate of George Woolsey, &c. was read the second time and passed. Sent to the senate by Mr. Jenifer and Mr. Johnson.

The supplement to the act to raise recruits, was read the first and second time by especial order and passed. Sent to the senate by Mr. Oneale and Mr. Duvall.

Mr. Johnson, from the committee, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker a bill, entitled, An act to empower Frank Leeke, of Prince-George's county, to settle and collect the debts due to Thomas Philpot, of London, merchant, and to apply the same; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

The bill to empower Robert Dick to settle and collect the debts due to David Dalzell, &c. which was committed for amendment, was read with the amendments and passed.

John Henry, Esq; from the senate, delivers to Mr. Speaker the bill allowing a longer time to compound on old certificates, &c. endorsed; "By the senate, June 3, 1782: Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Amendments proposed. Strike out the words "formation of the present government," in the fourth line of the first page, and insert "first day of March 1777, or having surveys since made by virtue of warrants granted before that time." Strike out the words "formation of the present government," in the nineteenth line of same page, and insert "first day of March 1777." Strike out the fourth line from the bottom of the same page, with the interlineation, and insert, "and all certificates returned upon warrants granted in virtue of the act to appropriate certain lands to the use of the officers and soldiers of this state, and for the sale of vacant lands, or hereafter to be granted." In the third line from the bottom, strike out the word "three" and insert "six."

In the fourth page, after "acre," in the fourteenth line, insert, "and shall thereupon be entitled to patent of confirmation; but nothing herein shall be taken or construed to oblige or compel the owner or possessor to pay for surplus land, or in any manner to weaken the title of such owner, or to give any person except the owner under the grant heretofore issued, a right to take up or obtain a grant for any such surplus."

In the eighth line from the bottom of the fourth page, strike out the words "formation of the present government," and insert "first day of March 1777."
