The house appointed Mr. Robert Remolds sergeant at arms, and Mr. Cornelius Mills door-

keeper. ORDERED, That they be qualified.

ORDERED, That Mr. Brice T. B. Worthington and Mr. Chase wait on his Excellency, and inform him, that this house is met and ready proceed on business, and to receive any thing he

may think proper to lay before them.

ORDERED, That Mr. Dashiell, Mr. N. Wordington, Mr. Cradock, Mr. Quyna, and Mr. M'Mechen, be a committee to examine and inspect the returns of elections, and report whether they have been made agreeable to mode prescribed by the constitution and sorm of government.

That Mr. Brice T. B. Worthings Mr. Chie, Mr. Fell, Mr. Hall, and Mr. Kent, be a committee of grievances and courts of thice, and that they have power to fend for persons, pa-

pers, and records.

That Mr. Hindman, Mr. Brogden, Mr. Stewart, Mr. Sewell, Mr. Done, Mr. Bond, and Mr. S. Worthington, be a committee of claims, and to examine into the state of the treasury and loan-office.

That Mr. Quynn, Mr. N. Worthington, and Mr. Ogle, be a committee to enquire what

laws have expired, or will expire during this fession, or at the close thereof.

That Mr. M'Mechen, Mr. Job, Mr. Dashiell, Mr. Magruder, and Mr. Stewart, be a committee to receive and examine any proposal for the establishment of manusactories, and to consider and report the best means for setting on soot manufactories, and promoting the trade and commerce of this state; also to enquire into and report what bath been done by those who have heretofore received encouragement for manufactories.

RESOLVED, That this house will fit during this session, for the dispatch of public business,

from 9 o'clock in the morning till 3 o'clock in the afternoon.

ORDERED, That Mr. Quynn request the reverend Mr. Gates to perform divine service every

morning during this session at 9 o'clock.

The house appointed Mr. George Ranken, Mr. Archibald Golder, and Mr. John Knapp, committee cleiks. Ondened, That they be qualified.

The house adjourns till to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.

## A Y, November 12,

HE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. A letter of excuse from William Fitzhugh, for not attending on the day appointed for the meeting of the general affembly, was laid before the house and read. Mr. Robettion Stevens, a delegate returned for Dorchester county, appeared, and after qualifying in the mode prescribed by the constitution and sorm of government, took his seat in the house.

ORDERED, That the following rules be observed this session:

1. At the hour appointed for fitting, the roll of the house shall be called over, and the absent

members, if any, sent for.

2. If any member be absent at the hour appointed for litting, the speaker and twenty of the members being met, he shall be fined, unless excused by the speaker, two shillings and six-pence current money for every neglect, to be deducted out of his allowance.

3. Every member shall take his seat when the speaker takes the chair, remain uncovered

until the house rises.

4. Every member who shall deliver his opinion, or speak in any debate, shall stand up in his place, and with respect and decency address himself to the speaker.

5. No member, at the time of his speaking in debate, shall name any other by his proper

name, but shall use some other distinction.

6. If two or more members shall rise to speak at the same time, the speaker shall declare who hall speak first.

7. No member shall speak oftener than twice in any debate, except with leave, nor shall any

member be interrupted while he is speaking in orders

8. Any member called to order by the speaker or any member, must thereupon take his seat. 9. While the house is fitting, no member shall speak to another, so as to interrupt any memher who may be speaking in debate.
