John Henry and Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, Esquires, from the senate, acquaint Mr. Speaker that the Governor is waiting in the senate to sign and seal the engrossed bills, and requests the attendance of this house for that purpose.

Mr. Speaker left the chair, and, attended by the members of this house, went to the senate, and there presented the following engrossed bills to the governor, who signed the same, and affixed the great seal thereto, in presence of the members of both houses, viz.

No. 17. An act for the more effectual paving the streets of Baltimore-town, in Baltimore county.

No. 18. A Supplement to the act to enable Thomas Contee to settle and collect the debts due to William Molleson, and William and Robert Molleson, or either of them, and to apply the same.

No. 19. An act for the relief of the family of William Edmiston.

No. 20. An act to make good the depreciation of pay to captain Philemon Griffith.

No. 21. An act to make valid a deed from Basil Burgefs of Anne-Arundel county, to Daniel Bowley of Baltimore county.

No. 22. An act to ascertain the property of the citizens of this state carried off or destroyed by the enemy during the present war.

No. 23. An act concerning estates tail.

No. 24. A Supplement to the act for the liquidation and payment of debts against persons convicted of treason.

No. 25. An act proposing to the citizens of this state, creditors of congress on loan-office certificates, to accept this state for payment on the terms therein mentioned.

No. 26. An act for the defence of the bay, and to impose certain duties on imported articles.

No. 27. An act to appoint an intendant of the revenue.

No. 28. An act to settle and pay the civil list, and the other expences of civil government.

No. 29. An act to repeal the taxes and duties imposed and appropriated for the redemption of the bills of credit emitted in the years seventeen hundred and eighty and seventeen hundred and eighty-one.

No. 30. An act to enable the visitors of Talbot county school to sell the lands belonging to said school.

No. 31. An act for the payment of the journal of accounts.

No. 32. An act to continue the acts of assembly therein mentioned.

No. 33. An act to raise a sum of money for the payment of the officers and soldiers of the line of this state, from the first day of August seventeen hundred and eighty to the first day of January seventeen hundred and eighty-one.

No. 34. A Supplement to the act to raise the supplies for the year seventeen hundred and eighty-three.

Mr. Speaker, with the rest of the members, returned and resumed the chair.

The house adjourns till the first Monday in May next.

So ends this session, this fifteenth day of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty-three, and in the seventh year of our independence.
