the governor of this state, respecting the memorial of Sick Kiesar, in behalf of himself and thirty-sour others, natives of China and Bengal, being part of the crew of the Pallas Indiaman, commanded by captain John O'Donnell.

Mr. Wootton appeared in the house.

Thomas Stone, Esq; from the senate, delivers to Mr. Speaker the bill to approve, confirm and ratify, the compact made by the commissioners, &c. ensorted; " By the senate, November " 21, 1785: Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

" By order, J. DORSEY, clk. By the senate, November 21, 1785: Read the second time by especial order and will pass.

"By order,

DORELY, clk. J DOREEY, clk."

Which was ordered to be engrossed.

The leveral letters from the board of treasury of the United States, and from the secretary of

congress, with the resolutions respecting finance, were read.

The letter from William Smallwood, Eig; notifying his acceptance of his appointment as go-

vernor, was read.

ORDERED, That a committee be appointed to report an estimate of the supplies necessary for the current year, for continental and state purposes, with their opinion of the ways and means to raise the same.

The house proceeded to ballot for the said committee, and the ballots being deposited in the ballot box, the gentlemen named to strike retired, and after some time returned and reported, that Mr. Chase, Mr. Hall, Mr. B. Worthington, Mr. Lethrbury, Mr. Carroll, Mr. I urner, and Mr. Ke,, had a majority of ballots.

On reading and confidering the report from the commissioners of this state, appointed to meet the commissioners from the commonwealth of Virginia, to regulate and settle the juristitution and navigation of Parow sack and Pocomoke rivers, and that part of Chefaprake bay which litth within the territory of Virginia, the house came to the following resolutions, to wit.

That it is the opinion of this house, that this state should consur with the I. RESOLVED, commonwealth of Virginia, in making a joint application to congress for their conf nt to form a compact for the purpose of affording, in due time, and in just proportion between the two states, naval protection to such part of Chesapeake bay and Patowmack river, which may at any time herestter be left unprovided for by congress, and that such compact, when made, be laid before congress for their approbation; and that such compact, if approved, should continue until mutually diffolved by the two states, or until congres shall declare that such compact ought no longer to exist.

2. RESOLVED, That it is the opinion of this house, that if the general affembly of the commonwealth of Virginia concur in making such application to congress, the delegates from this state to congress be authorised and requested to make such application on behalf of this state, in conjunction with the delegates from the commonwealth of Virginia, to congress, or with such

other persons as the legislature of Virginia shall appoint for that purpose.

3. RESOLVED, That it is the opinion of this house, that foreign gold and fiver coir, received in the two flates as the current money thereof, should pais in the two gove noments at the same value, according to its fineness and weight; and that, if the species of coin could be regulated at the same nominal value, it would be of great convenience to the commerce between the citizens of the two states.

4. RESOLVED, That it is the opinion of this house, that the damages on foreign bills of exchange protested, ought to be the same in both states, and that receign protested bills of exchange should be considered, in all cases and to all purposes, as of equal rack with debts

upon contract in writing, figned by the party.

5. RESOLVED, That it is the opinion of this house, that draughts by the merchants of either state upon those of the other, in the nature of inland bills of exchange, should be surject by law to official protest by a notary public, and that the damages for non payment sh uld be the same in both states.

6. RESOLVED, That it is the opinion of this house, that it is effential to the commerce and revenue of the commonwealth of Virginia, and of this state, that duties on imports or exports (if laid) should be the same in both states; and that it is proper for the legislarures of the said states, at their annual meeting in the autuan, to appoint come officiners to meet and communicate the regulations of commerce and duties proposed by each state, and to concer on such subjects as may concern the commercial interests of both states, and within the power of the respective states; and that the number of the said commissioners should be equal, not less than three nor more than five, from each state; and that they should annually meet in the third week of September, if required by the legislature of either state or the commissioners thereof, at such place as they should appoint.

7. RESOLVED, That it is the opinion of this house, that the third, fourth, fifth, and fixth resolutions, should be communicated to the legislatures of Delaware and Pennsylvania; and that, they be requested to nominate commissioners for the purpose expressed in the fixth resolution, and that his excellency the governor be requested to transmit immediately copies of the said resolu-

tions to those states.
