The bill to declare and ascertain the right of the citizens of this state to private roads or ways, and the bill for the benefit of the estate of Anne Catharine Green, were sent to the senate by Mr. Turner.

The order of the day is postponed till to-morrow morning.

The report on the petition of sundry inhabitants of the village of Elk (at the head of Elk river,) was read the second time, and the question put, That the house concur therewith? The yeas and nays being called for by Mr. Oneale appeared as follow :

So it was resolved in the affirmative.

Mr. Ridgely of William appeared in the house.

RESOLVED, That the governor and council be, and they are hereby authorized and requested to instruct the collectors of the public assessments in the several counties of this state, to receive the emission of the eighth day of June in the year seventeen hundred and eighty, (commonly called and distinguished by the name of the state emission, or black money,) with the interest calculated thereon, in payment of all arrearages of taxes due before the first day of January in the year 1786, and not appropriated by law.

Mr. Bracco, from the committee, brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker a report respecting commissioners appointed to lay out a common high way or road, on as streight a line as the county would permit, from Baltimore-town to Elizabeth-town in Washington county, and from thence to the westernmost part of this state; which was read.

A memorial from the officers of the Maryland line, was preferred and read, and referred to Mr. Joseph Dashiell, Mr. Bracco, Mr. Joshua Seney, Mr. B. Worthington, and Mr. Stone, to consider and report thereon.

Mr. Beatty brings in and delivers to Mr. Speaker a bill, entitled, An act to vest in Philip Nollart of Frederick county, certain lots of land therein mentioned; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

RESOLVED, That to hasten the completion of the business of this session, this house will, besides their usual hours, also sit during the remainder of the said session from the hour of five o'clock in the afternoon until nine.

The Supplement to an act, entitled, An act to establish a market in Frederick-town in Frederick county, and for the regulation of said market, was read the second time by especial order and passed.

The bill to enable any of the United States to prosecute actions in any court of law or equity against any person residing within this state, was read the second time and passed.
