

30 VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS, NOVEMBER SESSION, 1800.

The clerk of the senate delivers a petition from Joseph Calman and Louis Du Bourg, of the city of Baltimore, praying an act of insolvency, endorsed; "By the senate, November 19, 1800: Read and referred to the consideration of the house of delegates.

T H U R S D A Y, November 20, 1800.

THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. Montgomery, from the committee, delivers to the speaker a bill, entitled, An act to aid and amend defects in the records, papers and proceedings, in the register of wills office of Harford county, and to prescribe the form of the register's bond in said county; which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

On motion, Leave given to bring in a supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the relief of the poor of Caroline county. ORDERED, That Mr. Orrell, Mr. Mason and Mr. Clarke, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

Mr. Harwood, from the committee, delivers to the speaker the following report:

THE committee to whom was referred the petition of sundry inhabitants of Anne-Arundel county report, that they have taken the same into consideration, and are of opinion, the prayer of the petitioners appearing reasonable, ought to be granted.
