

The clerk of the senate returned the bill, entitled, *An additional supplement to an act, entitled, An act for quieting possessions, enrolling conveyances, and securing the estates of purchasers; also the bill, entitled, An act for the widening of certain streets near the Washington Monument in the city of Baltimore, and for other purposes therein mentioned; also the bill, entitled, An act for the relief of John Childs, of Anne-Arundel county; also the bill, entitled, An act to provide for enforcing the collection of penalties incurred under existing resolutions of this state; also the bill, entitled, An act to encourage the destruction of crows in Queen-Anne's county, severally endorsed "will pass."* Ordered to be engrossed.

Also the bill, entitled, *An act to extend the powers of the commissioners of the school fund in Queen-Anne's county, and to encourage the establishment of free schools in said county; also the bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the despatch of business in Frederick county court, passed at December session 1829, chapter 107; also the bill, entitled, An act to establish an academy in the town of Greensborough, in Caroline county, severally endorsed "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were severally read the first, and by special order the second time, assented to, and the bills ordered to be engrossed.*

Also the bill, entitled, *An act relating to the summoning of jurors in Baltimore city; also the bill, entitled, A further additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act to establish pilots and regulate their fees; also the bill, entitled, An additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the relief of sundry insolvent debtors; also the bill, entitled, An additional supplement to an act to amend the lottery system, severally endorsed, "will not pass."* Also the resolution in favour of Henry Wayman, endorsed "assented to." By the Senate,

February 23, 1831.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

The senate have given to the bill relating to the lottery system the most mature reconsideration, and have found no reason for changing their opinion. They entertain the belief that the morals of the people have been infinitely benefited by the restrictions heretofore, and most carefully imposed upon the sale of foreign tickets, and they are unwilling to again open the door to all the mischiefs which would in their opinion flow from such a course.
