

WEDSNEDAY, January 16th, 1833.

The house met; present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act to incorporate the Savings Institution of Dorchester county;

The bill, entitled, An act to authorize the clerk of Baltimore county court, to record two bills of sale, from Joseph R. Ford to George and David King;

The bill, entitled, An act to repeal an act, entitled, An act to abolish imprisonment for debt on certain judgments rendered by Justices of the Peace, passed at December session 1830, chapter 155;

The bill, entitled, an act to authorize the conveyance of certain real estate therein mentioned;

The bill, entitled, an act to incorporate "The Horticultural Society of Maryland;"

The bill, entitled, an act to amend certain acts therein mentioned, and for other purposes;

And the resolutions in favour of Barbara Reily; (widow of Major William Reily) and Doct. Ennals Martin; were sent to the Senate.

Mr. Harper presented a petition of Ann Harman, of the city of Baltimore, praying to be divorced from her husband, Henry Harman, which was read and referred to the committee on divorces;

And Mr. Duvall, of Prince Georges, presented a petition of sundry citizens of Prince Georges county, praying an alteration of the assessment law, passed December session 1831, which was read and referred to Messrs. Duvall, of Prince Georges, Gantt and Edelen.

The Speaker laid before the House a report from the clerk of Calvert county court;

Also, a report from Richard Hall, tobacco inspector, in the city of Baltimore, containing statements of the several sums of money paid by them into the Western Shore Treasury within the year ending on the 30th of November 1832; which were read, and severally referred to the committee on Ways and Means.

The Speaker also laid before the House, a report from the clerk of Calvert county court, relative to the attendance of Judges; which was read and referred to the committee on Grievances and courts of Justice.
