And, A letter from Nathaniel F. Williams, Esq., of the city of Baltimore, accepting his appointment as a member of the Executive Council, endorsed, "referred to the consideration of the House of Delegates."

On motion of Mr. Hughes,

Ordered, That the committee on pensions by county assessment, be instructed to inquire into the expediency of passing a law authorising the levy courts and commissioners of the several counties of this state, to place upon the pension list of their respective counties, such persons as they may consider proper objects of charity.

Mr. Ricaud submitted the following resolution, which was read the first and second time by special order, and assented to.

Resolved, That the Treasurer of the Western Shore, pay to William Welch, a delegate returned from Kent county, six days itinerant charges, in addition to those allowed on the journal of accounts, in as much as the said William Welch, in consequence of indisposition, was prevented attending at the Seat of Government, on the day fixed for the meeting of the legislature, and has since, by the severe frost and inclemency of the weather, been compelled to come around the head of the bay, in order to attain the seat of government.

On motion of Mr. Hood, the bill reported by him, entitled an act for the benefit of Richard Snowden, was taken up for consideration, read the second time, and passed.
