## PROCLAMATION.

Maryland, J. Son Bor HEREAS His Majesty by his Order in Council, on the 18th Day of August last past, reciting, that "Whereas two Petitions from the Province of Maryland, had been presented to his Majesty " at that Board, the one from the Governor and Council, and the other from the Commissary 44 and Clergy of this Province, which represented, amongst other Things, that there is a Suit de-" pending in his Majesty's High Court of Chancery of Great Britain, between the Lord Balti-"more, Proprietary of Maryland, and the Family of the Penns, who are the present Proprietaries " of Pennislivania, concerning the Validity of certain Articles of Agreement entered into between " them, for adjulting the Boundaries of their respective Provinces; and that pending the said Suit " great Diforders and Outrages had been Committed on the Borders of the Province of Maryland, " by the Inhabitants of the Province of Perinfolvania; who had fet Fire to the House of Crefap, "when Himfelf, Wife and Children, and Six others, were in it, and burnt the fame to the

"Ground; and that whilft the faid Persons endeavoured to escape the Flames, several Guns were fired at them, whereby one Man was killed, 44 and others wounded, and feveral were taken Prisoners and carried to the Goals in Penn's Cambar. And that therefore the Petitioners most hum-" bly prayed, amongst other Things, his Majesty's most gracious Interpolition and Commands, for the Preservation of the Peace on the Borders " of the faid Province. And that, Whereas the Lords of the Committee of Council, to whom his Majety referred the Confideration of the faid "Petition, had made their Report thereupon to his Majesty at that Board, His Majesty that Day took the faid Report into his Royal Confi-" deration, and was pleased, with the Advice of his Privy Council, to Approve of what was therein Proposed; and his Majesty did thereby ac-" cordingly Order and Command, That the Governors of the respective Provinces of Murjand and Pennjylvania for the Time being, do not, " upon pain of incurring his Majesty's highest Displeasure, permit or sufar any Tumulo, Riots, or other outrageous Disorders, to be Committed 45 on the Borders of their respective Provinces; but that they do immediately put a Stop thereto, and use their utmost Endeavors to preserve "Peace and good Order amongst all his Majesty's Subjects under their Government, inhabiting the faid Borders: And as a Means to preserve "Peace and Tranquility on the faid Borders, his Majesty did thereby Esjoin the faid Governors, That they do not make Grants of any Part of "the Lands in Contell between the Proprietaries respectively, nor of any Part of the Three Lower Counties, commonly called New-Castle, Kent "and Suffex, nor permit any Person to Settle there, or even to attempt to make a Settlement thereon, 'till his Majety's Pleasure should be further fignified. And his Majety was further pleased to Direct, that int Order, together with Duplicates thereof, should be delivered to the Proprietaries of the fair of the said respective Provinces. accordingly." Which Royal Order and Command being but just received by me :

HAVE, with the Advice of his Lordship's Council of State, thought sit, immediately to publish and proclaim the same as aforesaid, in Order that every of his Majesty's Subjects within this Province may have due and speedy Notice thereof, and govern themselves accordingly. And for the more persect Obedience to this his Majesty's Will and Pleasure, all Magistrates, Sherits, Surveyors, Officers, and other Persons Inhabitants of this Province, are hereby strictly Enjoin'd and Commanded, not only to prevent, discourage and discountenance, as much as they can, any Tumults, Riots, or other outrageous Disorders on the Borders aforesaid, or any suture Settlements in the Places aforesaid; but also from time to time to give immediate Notice to this Government of any fuch Tumult, Riot, or other outrageous Disorder, or any future Settlement, or Attempt to make such suture Settlement in any of the Parts or Places asorementioned, in Order that proper Measures may be taken for the putting a stop to, suppretting or punishing the same, and exacting the most persect and full Obedience to his Majesty's said Royal Order. And that none may pretend Ignorance of his Majesty's Commands in the Premises, all and every the Sheriffs of this Province, are hereby strictly enjoined and commanded to publish this Proclamation forthwith in their respective Counties, not only by reading the same, but also by immediately affixing Copies thereof at the most public Places in their respective Counties: And also, that at all and every the several County Courts to be Held from and after the Publication hereof, they and every of them shall read and publish this Proclamation, and so continue to 'read and publish the same, at all and every the succeeding Courts in their respective Counties, until they shall receive further Orders to the contrary.
